

# Providing comfort to children

GIFTS TO REDUCE FEAR AND ANXIETY

Strange surroundings, unfamiliar faces, unaccustomed smells and sounds—a trip to the hospital is traumatic for anyone, but for children, it is especially frightening. The "wishes" in this section will do so much to ease stress and comfort children during a hospital stay.





#### **Stuffed animals**

Each child admitted to the Pediatric Emergency Department receives a cuddly stuffed animal—a new friend to help alleviate the fear and stress of a trip to the hospital.

## Comfort blanket supplies

Families, friends, and caregivers are provided with a variety of craft supplies to create personalized, cozy fleece blankets for their loved ones to keep nearby for comfort and warmth.

## Cough Buddy™

Specially designed post-operative pillow—shaped like a stuffed animal—with a firm and flexible back to serve as a splint for the patient's incision.

Cough Buddy helps the patient cough and deep breathe after thoracic,

open heart, or abdominal surgery by supporting the child as she hugs the pillow during recovery, minimizing pain.

## GIFTS TO IMPROVE QUALITY OF LIFE FOR THE FAMILIES OF HOSPITALIZED CHILDREN

Few experiences are more difficult than having a child in the hospital. Uncertainty about the future, the pain of watching a child go through uncomfortable procedures, the challenge of maintaining a sense of normalcy—all these contribute to fear and anxiety. The items in this section are designed to reduce stress and help family members cope.

#### **Strollers**

Days and nights are long for a family in the hospital. A stroll around the unit may be just what's needed to provide a bit of distraction. The durable Maclaren Globetrotter stroller offers children a comfortable ride with partial recline. It's simple to fold and store.

#### **iPads**


iPads have become the go-to communication devices for families at YNHCH, keeping parents, caregivers, and siblings involved and informed about their child's care and condition. iPads allow staff to Skype caregivers who can't always be present at important meetings concerning their child. They are available to families on site for medical research. communication and entertainment. They also enable "virtual" visits with patients under visitor restriction due to flu or other illness. We hope to add iPads to all of our Children's Emergency Department waiting rooms to entertain children and their families as they wait for tests, procedures, evaluations, or results.

## NECESSITIES FOR THOSE WHO CAN'T AFFORD THEM

For those with limited financial resources, the stress of having a child in the hospital is often compounded by a host of unanticipated expenses—hospital meals, transportation, and parking costs—just to name a few. The wishes that follow, for things that so many of us take for granted, make an enormous difference to families going through difficult times.

#### **Everyday expenses**

To help families manage some of the unplanned expenses they face when a child is in the hospital.

#### GIFTS TO HELP KIDS BE KIDS IN THE HOSPITAL

Being in the hospital often requires children to face experiences and decisions that would be difficult even for adults—frightening diagnoses, painful treatments and side effects, and feelings of sadness from being separated from friends and social activities. All the "wishes" in this section are vitally important—they aim to bring our pediatric patients a few moments of the carefree joy of childhood.

#### **Books for all ages**

Board books, picture books, chapter books, and young adult books entertain patients during their hospital visits— and to take home when it's time to leave.

The NICU provides intensive care, consultative support and neonatal transport services for critically ill newborn infants in Connecticut and beyond. Yale-New Haven opened the world's first NICU in 1960. Premature infants and babies with congenital abnormalities or long-term problems receive the best care possible from teams of physicians and other care providers with expertise in every relevant specialty.

## **Family support activities**

Activities are scheduled for families of NICU patients to provide supportive interaction as well as opportunities for fun and relaxation.

## Books for bedside reading

Studies have shown that reading to babies in intensive care can help parents develop the same feelings of intimacy and attachment that parents of healthy newborns cultivate in the days and weeks after a baby's birth. In addition, parents who read to their hospitalized babies are three times as likely to continue reading to them at home.

This realistic baby model simulates newborn traits and provides lifelike clinical feedback to staff in emergency medicine courses, ensuring that their performance in an actual medical emergency is efficient and well-rehearsed. It allows multidisciplinary teams to practice each skill that contributes to the successful resuscitation of a patient. Features include the ability to simulate airway complications, breathing, cardiac and circulation issues, vascular access, and sounds exhibited by an infant in distress.

#### CHILDREN'S PSYCHIATRIC INPATIENT SERVICE

Children's Psychiatric Inpatient Service (CPIS) offers comprehensive, compassionate services in both inpatient and partial hospitalization programs for children with developmental or psychiatric disorders. Parents are encouraged to participate in treatment to help better understand their child, initiate active treatment and develop an effective discharge plan. CPIS is the only facility in Connecticut with a state-accredited special education school onsite.

Each child is provided with a journal to encourage writing and drawing as an outlet for expressing feelings.

## Creative arts guided activities for patients and their families

Visual art, writing, video, and music programs help ease the stress and isolation of the hospital experience. Patients and their families are encouraged to participate in these professionally facilitated, hands-on programs that inspire self-discovery and community.

### Art therapy for teens

Our art therapists coach adolescents in groups or, when necessary, by the bedside—in a variety of non-verbal arts activities designed to encourage skill-development, self-esteem, and self-expression.
